




REPORTING A PROBLEM WITH ROADS TO DEVON COUNTY COUNCIL

Parish Voluntary Wildlife Warden

It is a dry warm day in mid July and I'm heading to the Ford Brook Valley between Woodland Head and Posbury. As I walk up the lane from Binneford past Shortacombe Farm the extra tall growth of grasses and bracken triggered by our extremely wet winter is collapsing, filling and narrowing the lanes. Hedge bedstraw, honeysuckle and meadow sweet scent the air and at last the air hums with insects.

It's very quiet. The territorial birdcalls have all but ceased and it's a little early in the day for the swallows and housemartins to be on the wing. I cross straight over at three gate, past barley fields and into the cool dark of the trees below. I turn up the bridleway to the left and I can see new fields of winter vegetables and old kale fields now down to pasture. The soil here may be the Dun but it is bountiful if treated well. At Rock cross I stay to the right and go into Woodland Head, past the ancient oak and thatched cottages. On one, 2 nests of housemartins are visible.

At the junction I turn right. Honesty has set seed here so as I walk I pick some and scatter it further down the lane. The tall hedges give way to oaks as I walk down the steep hill. High banks pocked with animal holes and tracks, round twisted roots and rocks. A swarm of wild bees hover above old shrubby pasture.

Down and down, the banks higher, the woods darker and deeper. The silence broken by the sound of a jay screaming in the thicket. I'm lost in this cool dark world.

Reality breaks my reverie. By the bridge there's a lot of Himalayan balsam. A prolific alien plant introduced by Victorian plant hunters it is smothering our native riverside plants. It's illegal to allow it to grow or spread but here it is. I pull out all I can get to and I can see I'm not the first. Whilst it is in flower but not yet set seed, it's easy to pull out and can be put back on the ground. I can see more all along the valley on private land. Left alone this will become a major problem in years to come and send seed downstream far and wide. Land owners should be more responsible.

This is timber country and the ash dieback here is severe. Many trees have been felled which lets light in and the hazel seems to be the tree benefiting the most. Could we see more dormice as a result of more hazel trees? It's really sad to see so many ash trees lost but good to think there may also be positive outcomes.

As a walk from Winstone Cross right up the valley the trees turn from oak, ash and beech to conifer, where a goshawk has been seen nesting. Conifers provide thick and dry nesting sites. As the valley opens out I see more woodland, young and old, conifer and broadleaf, to the east side of the valley. A young buzzard calls from the tree cover.

I see a few butterflies but they are so fast and flappy that I cannot ID them but it's good to see any at all so far this year. It's been a terrible year so far for bees and butterflies.

I pause at the bottom of the next turning right, it's a very steep climb up. Here the field is down to pasture dotted with the bright tall blue flowers of chicory. It's not just a pretty flower but high in protein and minerals, a great fodder plant for grazing stock.

Up and up and up(!) until I'm finally at the top. As I rest on a gate a 2 large yellow dragonflies zoom over, hunting for insects.

All the land here is organic or out of cultivation. Bordered with woodland and blessed with few houses it really is one of my favourite places. It just feels and smells good. It smells of life and not chemicals. The air is clean and cool. I'm back at the top of the bridleway that leads to Woodland Head. I say goodbye to the ancient oaks and walk straight on towards Binneford and home.

CREDITON HAMLETS PARISH COUNCIL

At the July Crediton Hamlets Parish Council meeting the Clerk reported that she had received an update from the Council's solicitor regarding the planned acquisition of the Chapel cemetery and car park. The Clerk will report to Councillors over the summer and it is hoped that the documentation will be ready for signature at the September meeting.

Cllr Yarnold explained that he had been contacted by residents wanting to know why Devon County Council had resurfaced all of The Oaks when repairs were only needed to part. Cllr Yarnold also wanted to know the cost of the works. Cllr Letch (DCC) offered to investigate and report back.

Cllr Yarnold reported that the BBQ area of the Community Garden has been improved and asked whether the Parish Council would contribute towards the cost of a few hedging plants. This will be on the agenda for the next meeting.

Unless there are urgent issues, the Council does not meet in August. The next full Council meeting will be on Monday 2nd September at Yeoford Community Hall. The Folklore Library & Archive is delighted to announce that it has been awarded a generous grant from GWR's Customer & Community Improvement initiative, which seeks to support rail-related community engagement projects.

The money will fund a heritage project focused on collecting and preserving people's memories of Devon branch lines, with particular focus on the Exeter – Okehampton line, which is the first to be reinstated after falling victim to the Beeching cuts of the 60s and 70s.

The Folklore Library & Archive, which is a registered charity, is hoping to record people's recollections about the line, and to digitise and preserve old cine film and photos. The charity is also happy to receive donations or loans of artefacts.

Project manager Tracey Norman said, "The Okehampton line is unique, as it's the only branch line which has been reinstated so far, and there will still be people living who travelled on it prior to its closure, experienced its loss in 1972, and can now travel on it once again. We want to capture those special memories, preserve them and make them available to future generations of train enthusiasts, researchers and historians."

The charity is inviting anyone with memories to share about Devon's branch lines, especially Okehampton, to get in touch – passengers, staff, volunteers, drivers, and those who campaigned for the line's reinstatement.

"We'd also love to hear from any rail-related groups," Tracey said. "As well as a wealth of fascinating memories, they are also likely to have extensive collections of photos and video footage, which we can assist with preserving, digitising and safely archiving for the future."

RESURFACING OF THE OAKS

After its July meeting the Cllr Yarnold asked DCC for information about the decision to resurface the whole of The Oaks. Here is the reply received:

The road was surface dressed at an approximate cost of £12,000.

It is important for Councils to optimise the use of allocated highway maintenance funding, delivering value for road users and tax payers. To that end we adopt different maintenance n strategies. €

Surface dressing is an example of a preventative long term strategy which works alongside a more reactive strategy, for example pothole repair, and a planned structural strategy that treats larger areas.

In an ideal situation we would not be undertaking any disruptive and expensive reactive maintenance, however it is unfortunately an inevitable outcome of years of underfunding. climate change and the fragile rural nature of a large proportion of Devon's road network. More information can be found here: Funding and priorities - Roads and transport (devon.gov.uk).

Surface dressing is a very cost-effective maintenance treatment, both financially and environmentally, to improve skid resistance and seal the road surface, which will stop the ingress of water and help prevent potholes and wider structural deterioration appearing in the first place.

The development and introduction of proprietary finishes, while providing all the benefits described above, has also further improved the aggregate retention and provides a 'new road' look for a fraction of the cost. Due to the urban nature of The Oaks, Yeoford this type of additional finish was deployed on top of the surface dressing at this location.

In summary The Oaks was selected as part of a wider programme of preventative maintenance, ensuring that a cost effective planned intervention continues to take place across Devon's road network alongside more expensive structural treatments such as resurfacing.

Outside of safety defects (which will be corrected in line with our policy) and in terms of larger planned maintenance, by just treating the visually most deteriorated roads and not also taking steps to arrest the deterioration of other roads before they require very expensive interventions then a unsustainable backlog will simply continue.

County Councillor Newsletter—July

It seems to me that there are two very distinct roles to being a councillor. The first is to represent the people of my division by listening to their problems, complaints and observations and acting to resolve them. This I do by meeting people casually in the street, in the shops and also by holding surgeries in Crediton, Copplestone and Bow. I also receive a lot of correspondence through e-mails and always ask people to include my right to forward in their missive. I also get telephone calls but much prefer people to then reiterate their point in an e-mail as I then have a written record and something that I can pass on to the correct officer. As you all know my contact details are easily available.

The other side of the role is to attend meetings where we learn a lot of information, which we can pass on and also question a lot of the decisions made by the executive. I have been to several very interesting meetings recently. Two of them concerned the railway. We are lucky in Crediton to now have a half hourly service to Exeter and £18,000 has been spent on our station. Passenger numbers on the Tarka line are up to 800k, an increase of 50% The railway company is also looking at the impact of crossing the railway lines for those with mobility challenges. They are also thinking of a way of increasing the number of disabled parking spaces on the south side of the station which at the moment only has one. I was quite surprised in another railway meeting to learn that a cow on the line near Cullompton cost 800 minutes of disrupted services and 13 cancelled trains. It seems that trespassing on railway lines is a frequent and costly event. On a positive note 40 train drivers are being trained along with 60 other railway staff and there is to be an upgrade of rolling stock on our line but no date as yet.

At a health care meeting I was pleased to note that people in Mid Devon live on average just over one year longer than the rest of Devon and Devonians live a year longer than the national average. We also have a lower percentage of drug-related deaths at just 22 in Mid Devon. But even in this we cannot take much comfort. Mid Devon's suicide rate is easily the lowest in the county.

I attended the first Cabinet meeting under the new leadership. The most interesting item was the launch of the corporate plan 2024/25. There are 5 proposed corporate priorities in the action plan.

- 1) Secure better outcomes for our children through working with key partners.
- 2) Develop an investment plan for our road network. I'm sure we all look forward to that!
- 3) Improving and modernising our processes through digital solutions. I'm not sure that I understand that.
- 4) Working with citizens 2024/25 focus on highways and transport. This may well tie into option number two.
- 5) Building relationships with partners to facilitate improved and targeted community services.

These are clearly noble aims and I am sure that the relevant scrutiny committees will keep an eye on the executive's progress.
